10 useful phrasal verbs

put (something) off = to delay

- Can we **put off** the meeting until next week?
- We need to **put off** the launch date until further testing is completed.

bring (something) up = to introduce an idea or subject

- Today, I'd like to **bring up** the issue of staff expenses.
- In the meeting, Peter **brought up** the need for better communication between departments.

build on = to add or develop

- We must **build on** our reputation to expand the business.
- Building on Emily's idea, I'd like to suggest we do more trainining.

take on = to accept a new job, task, challenge

- He often **takes on** more than he can manage.
- Recently our company has taken on some large projects and expanded its market reach.

carry out = to do or complete an activity

- The training department **carries out** regular sessions with employees to keep their skills up to date.
- The IT department will carry out a system upgrade this weekend.

go up = to increase or rise

- The cost of living is going up, affecting many households.
- Our market share has gone up by 5%.

put up = to make higher or raise

- They plan to **put up** the price of their subscription package.
- The bank has **put up** its interest rates.

go down = to decrease or fall

- After the increase in price, sales began to go down.
- The team's productivity has been going down since the introduction of the new software.

cut down = to make less or reduce

- She used to work 50 hours a week but recently she's cut down.
- The team is exploring ways to cut down the project timeline.

move on = start a new topic / activity

- Let's **move on** to the final point on the agenda.
- I'd worked for the company for 10 years and felt it was time to move on.

+ 5 advanced phrasal verbs

tap into = to make use of a resource to achieve a result

- The sales **team is tapping into** social media for customer engagement.
- There is a supply of skilled workers that the company can tap into.

weigh up = to consider something's benefits and disadvantages

- We need to weigh up the impact of these changes on the project timeline.
- Before applying for the job, I weighed up its pros and cons.

zero in on = to focus your attention on smthg / sbdy

- Social media allows you to **zero in on** your target market.
- The team is zeroing in on solutions to address the current production challenges.

drill down = to go deeper / analyse further

- The boss told us to **drill down** and find out which products people like the most.
- The financial analyst **drilled down** into the quarterly reports to find areas for cost savings.

wrap up = to finish or complete something

- Let's wrap up the meeting by summarising the key points.
- She wrapped up the deal before she went on holiday.
